FACTS ABOUT THE IMPLEMENTATION OF PBIS IN EARLY CHILDHOOD

CORE COMPONENTS OF PBIS

- Leadership Team
- Nurturing, responsive and caring relationships
- Safe, organized and predictable environments
- Clear program-wide expectations
- Behavior expectations taught across all settings
- System to encourage and acknowledge expected behavior
- Consistent procedures to respond to challenging behavior
- Data-based decisionmaking system

OH PBIS Requirements

- Administrative commitment & involvement
- Team-based structures
- 3-5 schoolwide expectations
- Systematic instruction
- Reinforcement of desired behaviors
- Correction of behavior errors
- Data-based decision making
- Multi-tiered systems of support
- Maintain culturally responsive practices

WHAT IS PBIS?

Positive Behavioral Interventions & Supports (PBIS) is a framework used to organize a broad range of systemic and individualized strategies for achieving important social and learning outcomes in school communities while preventing problem behavior. The key attributes of PBIS include preventive activities, data-based decision making, and a problem solving orientation (Horner, 2000; Lewis & Sugai, 1999; Sugai et.al., 2000; Weigle, 1997).



WHY IMPLEMENT PBIS?

- ✓ Reduction in problem behavior
- Increased academic performance
- ✓ Improved perception of safety
- Reduction in bullying behaviors
- Increased administrator time for instructional leadership
- ✓ Reduction in staff turnover
- ✓ Increased perception of teacher efficacy
- ✓ Improved social-emotional competence
- Increased positive school climate and culture
